NOTES from Norm

Back to School

And so we are back to school... well, some of us anyway.

My son, Michael, is now a teacher. A for real, getting paid and part of the union, teacher! Wow.

It's a lot for me to grasp.

Pardon me for reminiscing for a few paragraphs

When I was in Kindergarten, it is reported that I came home one afternoon, threw myself upon the couch and announced "I don't care what they say about getting a better education for a better job - I quit!"

My kindergarten teacher, Miss McMurchy, had told us that she was getting married, and I saw no reason to continue to woo her with my learning, my winning smile, my expertise with Play-do or astounding ability to lie quietly during nap time. Miss McMurchy was a patient woman.

In Grade Two, now in a new school, Mrs. Schwartz sat me right in front of her desk on the very first day... and kept me there for the whole year! While the class was learning to make papier mache swans, I insisted on making a frog. She not only encouraged me, but she praised the finished product. Clearly, in both instances, Mrs. Schwartz was an insightful woman.

In Grade Four, Miss Storton would read aloud to the class from Enid Blyton's "Four for Adventure" books. She would eventually invite me to read to the class, encouraging my use of voices and sound effects. I never looked back. Miss Storton

saw something in me that I had yet to recognize (she also made me sit right in front of her desk).

In Grade Five, I was allowed... or perhaps invited to leave the class and peruse through the library. Mr. Borovoy thought my time might be better spent reading than doing whatever it was that I was doing when the work was done. He was likely very tired of looking at me, as I sat right in front of his desk, as well. He was a very trusting man.

In Grade Seven, I took music, because you had to (Home Ec was full). I had played the piano for about a year when I was eight and the memories of that experience were not inspiring. Then, Miss MacLean told me that I was a trumpet player. Surely, she was mistaken... the coolest kids, the ones who grabbed the horns first were trumpet players. But she insisted. And for the first time, I was able to sit at the back of the class... trumpets are always at the back. Within months, I would have my own key to the music room and at 7:30am I could be found blowing my horn, becoming the trumpet player - the musician, that Miss MacLean recognized. She was a very kind, insightful and brave woman (who else would give me keys?)

In High School, Mr. Dart would inspire me to read and learn from history; Mr. Boucher showed me dignity, even as he gave me a failing grade - demanding that I do better. Mr. Halloran would confront me and demand that I learn respect for others. Mr. Cringan would continue to

nurture the music in me, teach me form and invite me to write a musical. Mr. Tovell would make sure that the musical was produced. Mrs. Von Buttlar would patiently listen to my pitiful attempts at speaking French and then take the time to listen to my stories of what felt like my pitiful life. These people saw something of value in me and nurtured it (often wrestled it) into being. These were great people.

I would encounter more wonderful teachers in University and Graduate School and learn important lessons.

I would learn that:

"On time" is usually better than perfect.

Clever is usually in the eyes of the student, rarely the professor.

Some things don't make sense, but you still have to learn them.

Putting a third hand on the clock is not likely to endear you to the new teacher.

"Carpe Diem" is not Latin for Complain to God.

It takes very little to give someone dignity - but even less to take it away.

The stories in the Bible are very "real".

Just holding someone's hand is more powerful than any sermon, prayer or medicine.

I am who I am today because of some remarkably insightful, trusting, gracious, patient, demanding and brilliant teachers.

I hope that my son will be such a teacher. I suspect that he will (he's been

teaching me for years)

I invite you to take a few minutes this week and think about your teachers: The ones that you met in school; the ones that you have met elsewhere. Take a little time and give thanks for your teachers: The ones who have seen in you what you dared not see for yourself; the ones who have trusted you and believed in you. Give thanks to all the mentors, the nudgers, supporters, critics, confidants and friends; the ones who revealed to you something about the world... or more importantly, something about yourself.

When you've given thanks... or just had a trip down Memory Lane, I invite you to stop and think about the people that you have taught. You may not be a for real, getting paid part of the union teacher, but you have inspired others... you have trusted, shared insight, and believed in a great number of people. In your actions and thoughtfulness, you have revealed to others things about the world, and nurtured (even wrestled) others into being. You are a teacher.

Don't stop.

As the children and teachers recommit themselves to the process that we call education, take a moment and recommit yourself to being a teacher, too. Inspire, nurture, wrestle and believe in others. In that, you will be God's hands... just as surely as my teachers have been the hands of God holding, scolding, guiding and comforting me.

Getting to Know You

Julie Crann

Julie was born in Toronto and currently lives in Thorncliffe Park in Leaside. Her family includes a younger brother David who lives in Shanty Bay, is married and has three children. After Julie's dad passed away in March 1999 of a brain tumor, Julie's mother moved to Huntsville. When Julie is asked about some of her most pleasant experiences, she lists travel with her mom to Newfoundland to explore family roots as an unforgettable experience.

Upon getting to know Julie through the church, I soon learned that Julie's uncle was a boyhood friend of mine.

Julie is friendly and outgoing, an extrovert, who enjoys meeting people. She is an avid reader (everything from mysteries to historical novels and biographies); she has skills in embroidery and needlecraft (learned when she was ten years of age), and has a keen interest in languages but her real passion is music. This lady loves

music and has studied various instruments (guitar, flute, piano) but her favourite pastime relates to the vocal side of music.

While attending Barrie Central Collegiate, she participated in the Glee Club and various musical presentations. When Julie was a student at Victoria Park Secondary School, her choir went on tour in France and England.

A highlight was when her Victoria Village United Church choir performed a musical presentation for the Queen when she visited Toronto in June of 1973.

More recently, she is a member of the Toronto Choral Society and the Scarborough Choral Society. In the latter choir, Julie had the opportunity to participate in a 1998 choral presentation at the Queen's Plate when the choir sang a new version of The Maple Leaf Forever for the first time. Having recently witnessed an outstanding performance by the Toronto Choral Society, I understand why Julie is proud of her association with this highly

regarded choir.

Following the merger of churches, Julie has been an original member of the soprano section of the Jubilee United Church choir. Julie credits Arthur Wenk's leadership as Director of Music for the quality of music at Jubilee and the growth of Jubilee's choir.

In her working life, she was employed for twenty years (1975 to 1995) with Mutual of Omaha (now RBC Insurance). Today Julie takes on a variety of work assignments with a transitional employment program under the auspices of Progress Place (a rehabilitation center). Her duties have included the transcribing of reports (where special language or technical skills were required) as well as a range of other activities including receptionist work which suited her talents and interests as an outgoing person who liked meeting and inter-relating to people.

When asked what she most liked about Jubilee United Church, without hes-

itation, she mentioned our two ministers and the music leadership of our Director of Music. Julie also enjoys the many activities within the church from the Order of Good Cheer concerts to inter-generational activities like the Spring Fling. She thoroughly enjoys the fellowship of the people that make Jubilee their spiritual home.

When asked how we might improve the Jubilee experience, Julie indicated that she would like to see more youth participate in the activities of the church, for example, as a youth choir or as members of the senior choir.

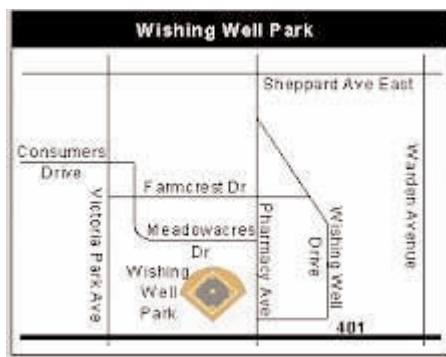
