Notes from Norm

It's September 2023 – so, now what are we going to do?

Rev. Bri-anne has moved on to the East End Ministry, our digital worship numbers are strong and a lot of new people have joined the Jubilee community in the past year, and we are planning an amalgamation with Forest Grove United Church. What are we going to do?

We don't know what's going to happen next... what can we do?

For starters, we're not going to panic. We are going to celebrate. We will celebrate Bri-anne's new ministry and take some pride in that as Bri-anne has helped to shape our community, we have helped to shape Bri-anne and her leadership. The trust that we have in God that allows for broad spiritual expression and community engagement, and the vulnerable sincerity that is evident at Jubilee will become part of East End Ministry – not that they lacked spirituality or community, but some of what we cherish at Jubilee will go with Bri-anne and impact East End Ministry.

Years ago, Jubilee wondered how we might have great impact on the United Church of Canada and Rev. Bri-anne Swan is part of our impact. In her absence, it is tempting for us to go and find another "Bri-anne" to take her place. But, of course, there isn't another Bri-anne Swan in the world and Jubilee finds itself in a time of great change as we envision a new ministry with Forest Grove United Church.

We're not sure exactly what we will need in leadership a year from now, so it makes sense for us to take some time as a community, assess our needs and aspirations and listen for the movement of the Spirit before we fill out our leadership team.

As we listen for the Spirit, Jubilee Council has invited me to help find some short-term leadership to keep Jubilee vital and open to God's call. We have a variety of guest preachers in order to hear more voices than mine. Rev. Alison Mock and Rev. Marlene Britton are already on our schedule and others are being sought. We are confident that we will soon have a technical producer on board to help us shape and maintain our digital ministry work - someone to edit, format, inspire and produce material for Tik Tok, Instagram, YouTube, Facebook and anywhere else that our digital ministry should engage. Our emphasis will not only be on opening up new projects and connecting with new people, but also producing material for our existing community and providing greater access for our traditional members.

I am currently speaking to people who might be interested in working with us for a few hours a week to coordinate and inspire our programs for community relevance – some call it social justice or outreach. We would benefit from someone who can help us focus on what we already do well, and perhaps invite us to consider other opportunities to be of value to the community near and far – to help us matter to people who do not come to Sunday worship. I am hoping to have someone in place by October, but we are prepared to take our time and find the right person.

What about new folks who have come to Jubilee? What are we going to do?

We are going to be changed by them. We are going to recognize that each person who decides to make Jubilee their home will change who we are, so we are going to provide opportunities for them to grow in faith and connection with Jubilee. We will find a way to welcome new members this year; we will have activities that we have never had before, because we are going to invite people into leadership roles and provide them with opportunities to share their gifts. We are going to bring back old things in new ways and shape together the community of faith we call Jubilee.

What about Forest Grove and amalgamation? We are exploring God's call for us to become community together. As a plan for ministry comes together this fall, we will share it with both congregations and eventually have a vote on whether or not we hear God's call to be together. We are imagining the coming together of our communities, under the name of Jubilee United Church, meeting and being community together in the current Jubilee United Church building. We would enhance our transportation network to make Jubilee accessible to folks living closer to Forest Grove United Church in Bayview Village and combine our considerable assets to create something that neither of our communities have ever done before.

We are hoping that the Grove Music School will find a home at Jubilee and grow the program to provide access to affordable music lessons to people in our immediate community and beyond. Right now, the Grove Music School has seven teachers and 42 students; we believe we can grow that number at Jubilee and provide community relevance to neighbours with music lessons and concerts that are not shaped by a profit model, but are seen as a ministry to the whole community. Forest Grove has the people and gifts; Jubilee has the facility and the community that would love such programs. Some of us can feel God calling us together.

Forest Grove will bring new people and traditions going back over 65 years and Jubilee will become new with their inclusion. It may not look much different to the outside world, but within our community we will be inviting some new leadership, creating new friendships and bonds, engaging new ideas and talking of the world and each other with new wisdom and experience.

Not only is Forest Grove proud of the Grove School, but they will bring with them a commitment to refugees through ways other than direct sponsorship. They will also bring years of worship experience, digital ministry and faith-filled activity that will find a home in Jubilee. Some of us feel God calling us to share these things together, but we will remain open to the movement of the Spirit and listen as God talks to us through each other, those on the amalgamation committee, and those providing support from the Shining Waters Region of the United Church. And when we know what God is calling us to do... we will do it.

So, I don't know what's going to happen next, but I'm pretty excited about it. I'm looking forward to the adventure of being led by the Spirit and doing things that we have not done before, even as I relish the return of some things that have always helped to describe Jubilee to myself and others. I am going to focus my time on worship (in-person and digital), amalgamation potential, pastoral care and new programs for Jubilee, as I rely on the rest of our community to provide leadership and support in the days ahead. Look at all of things that we've already go planned for the fall!

We don't know what's going to happen next; what can we do?

We can trust in God and in each other. We can listen to the Spirit whisper and occasionally shout... we can

enjoy being community together and we can love one another. Even if we knew exactly what was going to happen next, I think we would do exactly the same thing.

I trust you and I trust God. And, truthfully, I can't wait to see what happens next.

God bless you and all of us in the days ahead.

AN UPDATE FROM THE OUTREACH COMMITTEE

In 1970, Diana Ross recorded her first single album after leaving The Supremes. "Reach Out and Touch Somebody's Hand" became a hit single, recorded by many artists over the years. Its lyrics have inspired countless individuals and groups, including communities of faith like Jubilee United.

In the June issue of *Jubilation*, Rev. Bri-anne summarized the many outreach activities of our past, present, and possible future. The Benevolent Fund

The Benevolent Funds helps those who fall through the cracks. It helps to pay a hydro bill, or helps with modest medical support. It provides grocery cards and helps folks make ends meet.

The Benevolent Fund is modest and discreet; there are no reports made or records kept. It is used entirely at my discretion. It is my policy to shy away from repeat requests, and to try to keep the amounts given modest, so that we can reach as many as possible and not turn people away when the funds are depleted. Support from the people of Jubilee has been exceptional and you may never know the people that you have helped; but then again, they just might be sitting beside you in church one day.

Thank you for all that you have done in the past. Should you wish to contribute in the future, donations can be made directly to me, but also to the Church office or in the offering box in an envelope marked "Benevolent Fund". You can also e-transfer to admin@jubileeunited.ca or use Canada Helps and simply note "Benevolent Fund" in the box.

Donations made through the office will assure that you will get a tax receipt. To me directly, that's not as reliable (I do forget to write things down from time to time.)

place by others, but you do the cooking. If we had six teams (could be a couple of friends or a social group) that would cook for Community Table twice a year, we would be set.

I would love to have someone to co-ordinate volunteers - not recruit them, just co-ordinate them as they volunteer for things like Community Table, Definitely NOT Church or another event. Someone who is good at keeping lists and sending out reminders by phone or email.


I would love to have some folks record scripture readings for digital services. I am thinking about setting up a video recording space a couple of Sundays each month at Jubilee to record people reading scripture for upcoming Sundays, or having people do it themselves and send the results to me. I'll have the readings prepared; all you have to do is volunteer.

I would love to have someone manage a wireless point-of-purchase machine on Sundays or at events. You know the "tap" machines in retail outlets and coffee shops? We have one and lots of people would prefer to tap their money to Jubilee rather than search through their pockets for cash that they hardly use anymore. But we can't just leave a machine unattended. With about 10 minutes of training, a volunteer could help make it easier for people to provide financial support to Jubilee.

Should we have a Christmas Dinner at Jubilee or something to celebrate the New Year in 2024? I would love to have some folks help come up with ideas and create opportunities for Jubilee and Forest Grove folks to get to know each other as we consider amalgamating our communities. Some fun things, some serious things. What can we do together that will help us get to know each other and discover our shared values and potential?

JUBILEE PROPERTY REPORT

Summer may be a time for some people to take vacations and kick back a bit but not at Jubilee! For property, summer is the season for maintenance work, completing key projects and identifying new projects. As always, this work reflects the dedication, critical eye and leadership of Barb Second. Thanks Barb!

LED Lighting

The LED lighting retrofit of approximately 800 bulbs/fixtures has been completed. We can enjoy sitting in the sanctuary and seeing everything working with the extended life of LED. We are closing out the project and submitting our invoicing to get our approved grant money to cover the full cost of the work.

New Exterior Doors

As reported in the last Jubilation, our six new exterior doors were close to being delivered and we did get them in late July. We are now working on having them installed in September: North entrance (two) and Garden Room (four) in September.

Sanctuary Accessibility Ramp

Working with our architect, Adam McGean, we prepared a package that was submitted to the City Variance Committee. After a long wait, we got great news in mid-August that our request to use the east hallway was

approved! The Ramp Up team all supported selecting this as a primary option for a variety of reasons. We will now be working on next steps in the detailed design, selecting a contractor and obtaining building permits.

We are grateful to Elizabeth Clarke, Kathy Coats and Brian Kalanda who led the \$5,000 fundraiser that ran for the past two months. Thanks to everyone's support and generosity, the \$5,000 goal has been achieved! There are more envelopes, and every dollar helps, so if you have not yet



donated, please consider doing so. We are waiting to hear if we will get a grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

Maintenance

During COVID, we postponed many projects to help manage costs, some for 2+ years. Given our mission to maintain the building as one we are proud of, we had to invest in key projects, get them scheduled (not easy in a busy facility) and done, notably:

- windows cleaned inside and out,
- hallways and auditorium tile floors stripped and waxed,
- carpets cleaned,
- foyer and garden room ceramic tile floors cleaned and sealed, and
- numerous plumbing issues addressed.

Additional Projects

We have more work planned for the rest of 2023:

- installation of the six new exterior doors.
- vinyl cladding on the wood soffits,
- repainting parking lot lines, and
- repairing barbeque.

REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Trustees are responsible for acting with legal fiduciary responsibility for the protection of the assets of Jubilee United Church. We meet quarterly, currently in a virtual format, beginning with a financial update from treasurer, Gary Norris. John Sharp provides an overview of our financial performance as it applies to our investment funds. The return on our investment funds is required to assist in addressing our current operating deficits.

Each trustee has a specific area of responsibility and provides an update at each meeting.

- Elizabeth Clarke chairs the meetings and provides information on the status of employee contracts.
- Rai Remmel has responsibility for health and safety policies and programs.
- Rick Fries updates us on the renters and revenue expectations in close collaboration with Property Manager, Barb Secord.
- Charlie Scott has responsibility for insurance, and a recent appraisal confirmed the opinions of Barb Secord and Brian Kalanda that we were considerably under-insured on our property and chattels. We now have that additional coverage and, with the United Church assuming responsibility for insuring individual churches, we are now experiencing some savings in our annual insurance costs.

As members of the Board of Trustees serve for a specific term (minimum of two years) there is always an opportunity to welcome new members. If you have an interest in serving, please let one of our current members know.

On Sunday, September 3, we celebrated a four-year ministry with Rev. Bri-anne Swan as she preached her last sermon as part the Jubilee Leadership Team. She was brilliant.

We gave Bri-anne an advent stole that symbolizes new beginnings, loving support



and the holy mystery of how God calls us into ministry. We also gave Bri-anne a bee-keepers hat as her new office at East Ministry opens onto the roof where they keep local beehives (yes, Bri-anne is allergic to bees!). The folks who gathered on Sunday were able to sign the hat and Rev. Bri-anne will keep it in her office and always remember that we have her back!



Bri-anne sang with Jeannie during the offertory, enjoyed the cake we provided and took a moment for a couple of "sacred selfies" so that we will always have proof that we loved working together. Bri-anne's impact on Jubilee will be with us always and we hope that our impact on her will never be far from her heart or her practice of ministry in the days and years ahead.
